It's time to pull out Sonny Rollins Saxophone Colossus, Matthew Sweet's Girlfriend, and Van Morrison's Days Like This. One of the great joys of May is rotating out the "late-winter" music in favor of "springtime" music.

Vivaldi's *Four Seasons* can obviously be listened to all year long, as well as any Ella Fitzgerald, Lyle Lovett, and Ray Charles. But there are some cds and albums that are best listened to when spring is in full swing. Driving around with the windows down, mowing the grass, and eating ice cream outside each beg for appropriate soundtracks.

You may not like any of these recordings, which is fine. I won't make you listen to them. Our relationship doesn't depend on us liking the same music.

You and I are drawn to each other for another reason. And it isn't about what food we like or don't like, how much money we have or don't have, sports teams, education, or cultural heritage. Actually, it isn't about us at all.

In the midst of our differences, we are brought together and learn how to coexist because of Jesus Christ. It sounds fairly simple, but can be difficult to live. Part of the joy – and struggle – of life together is learning to appreciate our differences and to see beyond ourselves.

Soon after moving into the freshman dorm at Wittenberg University, I discovered that my roommate didn't rotate his music.

(Doesn't everyone do this?) I was pulling out my "Moving into College" music, when he mentioned that he didn't really listen to music.

Over the next months, we had to be intentional as we learned how to navigate our little dorm oasis. I wanted to wake up with John Coltrane, while he wanted to wind down late-night with television. Conversations and compromise served us well and helped us understand each other. Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove, in his book *New Monasticism*, talks about our need to be in community. He suggests that life lived together is at the heart of Jesus' life and mission.

He says, "Whatever else Jesus may have been about here on earth, it seems pretty clear from all accounts that he came to make it possible for those who believe in him to be reconciled to one another and to God... 'Love one another' wasn't just about being nice but meant learning to negotiate the real differences between people who were trying to live together."

As our world and neighborhoods become increasingly diverse on all fronts, it is imperative that we engage each other with attitudes of hospitality and a willingness to listen in the name of Jesus. It is hard work, but we cannot retreat to ourselves. We need each other. Don't check out – tune in.

Discover what you have in common.
Celebrate how God is at work in
others. Recognize that God is at work
through you.

This is an exciting month when youth of all ages are in front of us for a variety of reasons. During the month of May, we will celebrate the affirmation of baptism of thirteen of our youth, the high school graduation of eleven of our youth, and the participation of countless others in our Christian education over the past

year. It is a month when we cannot help but notice the presence of the youth of this congregation as we celebrate their commitment to God, their accomplishments, and their presence among us.

I was recently asked to serve on a task force with folks from all over Kansas and Missouri, addressing one of the four statements of what we hope to be about in mission together that arose out of the new Central States Synod purpose statement: Changed by Love, Sent in Love, to Serve. Those four missional directions are: igniting spiritual renewal, raising up leaders of all ages for the church, building bridges across the differences that divide our society, and inspiring and equipping people to be a part of what God is up to in their everyday lives.

Those of us called together to brainstorm how we might raise up leaders of all ages for the church had a great time talking about what it means to be a leader. We recognized that leadership comes in all shapes and sizes. Some people stand out as obvious leaders. Others lead in a more subtle way. Some have been leading for years, while others are already leading while they are still learning to walk.

So often, we talk about children and youth being the "future of the church." And that's true. They are.

But they are not just the future of the church; they are a vital part of the church right now – today. Youth are often our best evangelists, as they invite friends to come to church with them. They are leaders in worship as they provide music, carry the cross, collect the offerings, and read the scriptures. Their insights to life and honesty in speech (while sometimes concerning for their parents) can open our eyes to new ideas and new ways of thinking.

I was recently talking to a pastor friend about our practice of children's sermons moving into the sharing of the peace. While I have always treasured that moment and think it is powerful for the kids to be a part of it, that conversation shed new light on the fact that we were offering an opportunity for leadership to some of our youngest members as we invite them to share the peace with the congregation. It isn't just a "cute" moment during the service, but a moment in which those young voices lead the congregation as they share the great gift of God's peace.

I once heard that in order for a youth to remain active in church as they grow up, they need three adults, other than their parents, to show interest in them at church. Let this month – when we lift up the youth of our congregation in a variety of ways – be the month that you begin to more intentionally reach out to these young leaders of today and tomorrow. Learn their names, show interest in their lives. Live into the promise we each make at every baptism – to support these youth and pray for them in their life in Christ. Celebrate who these youth are and who they will become, as we all continue to lead and serve together as the body of Christ!
