As we turn the page into August, there's a certain hum in the air. Summer vacations are winding down, back-to-school sales are everywhere, and while the heat still blares, we can almost imagine those cool fall mornings just around the corner.

August is a month of transition. Families with kids are getting ready for school schedules and activities again. But even if you're not buying school supplies anymore, you can feel the shift. Our rhythms change, our energy shifts, and we begin to look ahead.

In the church, August is a time for planting seeds literally and figuratively. Ministries begin to stir again, meetings return to the calendar, and things slowly start gearing up for the season ahead. The truth is, even before things officially begin, the work has already started. Teachers know this before students ever arrive, you prepare. It's the same for us as a church. We lay the groundwork, set the tone, and get ready for what's ahead.

Paul writes in Colossians 2:6-7: "As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving."

I love that image of being rooted and built up. Our roots run deep here, roots in worship, scripture, service, and community. But roots are just the beginning. Paul reminds us that we're also called to grow, to stretch, and to live fully into the life Christ is calling us to.

So, as we step into this new season, here are a few ways we can live that out:

- · Come back to worship with intention. If summer's been scattered, make August your time to reconnect with God and with this community.
- Try something new. Teach Sunday School. Help with Youth Sunday (August 17). Assist with communion. Join a Bible study. Consider this your invitation to say yes.
- Pray for our students and teachers. As we bless backpacks (August 17) and classrooms open, let's surround them with love, encouragement, and prayer.
- Pay attention to what God is stirring in you. What hopes or questions are rising to the surface? Don't ignore them share them with someone.


The truth is, we are always being re-formed not just on Reformation Sunday or during Advent or Lent, but in these ordinary, everyday moments.


Youth Sunday

August Book Recommendation: Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer

If you're looking for a book that invites you to slow down, reconnect with the earth, and rediscover the sacred in the everyday, *Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants* is a profound and poetic companion. Robin Wall Kimmerer, botanist, professor, and member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, braids together three strands of understanding: Indigenous ways of knowing, Western science, and her own lived experience. With graceful storytelling and deep reverence, she invites us to consider the world not as a collection of resources, but as a gift-filled relationship.

Whether she's reflecting on maple trees, moss, or sweetgrass itself, Kimmerer teaches that gratitude and reciprocity are not only ancient Indigenous values but necessary postures for healing our planet. This is a book to be savored slowly, ideally with your feet in the soil and your heart open.

A beautiful summer read for those seeking wonder, wisdom, and a more intentional relationship with creation.

Despite strong giving so far this year, we continue to lag behind our conservatively developed budget by \$14,870, due in part to the timing of some annual giving. We had hoped to make up a little more ground by mid-year. 
Ladies **Night Out**

serving others.



Thatcher Rakestraw Reflection: Gods Wonder

My Dad and I recently went to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico. Philmont is one of four high adventure camps that Scouting has, and is the oldest. It was donated to the Scouts by Waite Phillips, who is famous for oil exploration and the boom and building of L.A. and Tulsa. Philmont allows Scouts to hike on its property for 7-12 days, covering 40-80 miles, and in those days, you only have what you are carrying on your back. They provide all your food for those days and a tent. In addition, you have to carry all your clothes and the rest of the gear you may need (water bottles, sleeping bag, utensils, etc.). Now you may be wondering how one gets ready for such a long, strenuous hike. Well, it takes a lot, some may say a troop. You gather with your troop about a year or two in advance and talk about what you would like to do on the trail, how many days you would like to stay on the trail, and how to get there. My troop, or as Philmont calls them, "crew," decided on a 12-day trek in which we would pick up food twice and hike Baldy, the highest point on the property. Now, after deciding all these things, we took this year to buy the gear we would need and to get our bodies ready



for the hike. Our trek number was 12-22, which is one of the hardest they offer. The 12 stands for days on trail, and the 22 is the toughness ranking of the trek. The toughness ranking can range from 1, being the easiest, to 28, being the hardest. The number of miles that our trek was supposed to be was 68, which already sounds like a lot, but soon we came to find out that that number was a lie. Our crew went over 125 miles at Philmont with some back-to-back days where we gained 3,000 feet of elevation each day. Now you may be thinking that only crazy people go on this, and you may be right, but the feeling you get when you climb a 12,500-foot mountain and get to look down at God's creation below and to hear and live in the world without a phone to check every second is something I will never forget. The world and the land of Philmont is so beautiful that anyone and everyone should just take a day and walk around and enjoy the wilderness. Maybe not go to the extent that my Dad and I went, but to just see everything and take it all in.
